# New Contemporaries opens at the ICA, London





15 January - 23 March 2025

The New Contemporaries annual exhibition opens at the ICA in London, marking the beginning of the organisation's 75th anniversary year celebrations taking place throughout 2025.

35 emerging and early career artists from across the UK have been selected to take part in the prestigious touring exhibition by artists Liz Johnson Artur, Permindar Kaur and Amalia Pica. As well as being included in the exhibition, the exhibiting artists have access to a range of opportunities including mentoring, talks, and workshops through New Contemporaries' Bridget Riley Artists' Development Programme. New Contemporaries and the ICA share a long-standing relationship and commitment to supporting early-career artists. The ICA hosted New Contemporaries from 1964 to 1986, its relaunch in 1989 and subsequent presentations into the 2010s.

The exhibition marks the beginning of a year of anniversary celebrations for New Contemporaries. 'A Vision with Artists' is a major programme taking place throughout 2025 which includes new commissions, public programmes, artist residencies and research designed to create new possibilities for artists and empower them to shape their own futures.

The 35 artists selected for the New Contemporaries exhibition are: Motunrayo Akinola, Libby Bove, Max Boyla, Molly Burrows, Fergus Carmichael, Mya Cavner and Edith Liben, Karen David, Roo Dhissou, Beverley Duckworth, Georgia Dymock, Tom Fairlamb, Farzaneh Ghadyanloo, Sara Graça, Dageong Han, Siomha Harrington, Anna Howard, Fi Isidore, Asmaa Jama and Gouled Ahmed, Laura Kazaroff, AC Larsen, Sophie Lloyd, Hazel O'Sullivan, Sun Oh, Sara Osman, Saul Pankhurst, Varshga Premarasa, Elliott Roy, Millie Shafiee, Sai Stephenson, Valentino Vannini, Joshua Whitaker, Danilo Zocatelli Cesco, and Yang Zou.

The exhibition offers an overview of urgent lived concerns, interests and social realities from this generation of artists. Themes include: the fluctuations and cycles in the natural world, sustainability and decay; boundaries, borders and fragmented memories; the commodification of mindfulness, self-care, pop culture and consumerism. Other works explore conviviality and social gatherings, juxtaposed with those that suggest anxieties or discontent in an increasingly alienating and digitally accelerated world.

Artist selector Amalia Pica said, "It was a true privilege to have such an overview of what artists in the UK are making today. We reviewed many applications and the conversation with the other two selectors was always engaging. I believe we ended up with a solid list and cannot wait to see all the works together in the exhibition and meet the artists."

Permindar Kaur said, "I really liked being part of the judging process and being given the opportunity to select work. The exceptional quality of the submissions received generated dynamic conversations about art, and I look forward to meeting the artists and seeing the exhibition when it opens."

Liz Johnson Artur said, "As one of the selectors, it was a real pleasure to see the works submitted and to consider what motivates the next generation of artists. I am very excited to see the final exhibitions in London and Plymouth come together and see how these artists progress with their practices."

Before travelling to the ICA, the exhibition launched at KARST, The Levinsky Gallery and MIRROR in Plymouth where it ran from 28 September to 7 December 2024.

#### **Selectors**

Amalia Pica explores systems of communication and civic participation in works that span from sculpture and drawing to performance, video, and installation. Pica was born in Neuquén in 1978, moved to Buenos Aires to complete her BA (2001) at the Escuela Nacional de Bellas Artes P.P. She was a resident artist at the Rijksakademie in Amsterdam in 2004-05 and now lives and works in London. Her work poses questions about contemporary systems of communication, human connection, social participation, and state control. Pica examines the things and circumstances that bring people together by injecting collective celebration into subjects rife with conflict or tediousness. Using simple materials and found objects, she investigates human modes of interaction and the political potential of joy. Pica received the Zürich Art Prize (2020); Paul Hamlyn Foundation Award (2011); and participated in the Cisneros Fontanals Art Foundation's Grants and Commissions Program (2011).

Permindar Kaur is a sculpture/ installation artist, whose approach to art is playful, using childlike objects to explore the territory of cultural identity, home and belonging. Kaur has exhibited internationally in both major solo and group exhibitions. Recent solo shows include: The Room, Niru Ratnam Gallery (2023); Outgrown, ArtHouse (2022) HOME, 5 Howick Place, London (2020-21); Hiding Out, Djanogly Art Gallery, Nottingham (2014); Cold Comfort (1996) Ikon Gallery. Major group exhibitions include Breaking the Mould: Sculpture by Women since 1945, YSP & UK tour (2021-23); Ikon in the 90's, Ikon Gallery, Birmingham (2021) Animals & Us, Turner Contemporary, Margate (2018): British Art Show (1995).

Liz Johnson Artur (b. 1964, Bulgaria) lives and works in London. Her practice includes photography, film and installation, placing the photograph as a starting point to develop work. She has shown internationally, with solo exhibitions of life of love of sex of movement of hope at FOAM Amsterdam (2021), Dusha at the Brooklyn Museum in New York and If you know the beginning, the end is no trouble at the South London Gallery in London (both 2019). Group exhibitions included A Time For New Dreams at the Serpentine Galleries, London (2019); the 10th Berlin Biennale (2018); Masculinities at Barbican, London (2020). She will show a new solo exhibition at Camera Austria in Graz in fall 2024.
