#### **About the Role**

The Life Model will play a crucial role in the Institute of Contemporary Arts' next exhibition *Laura Lima: The Drawing Drawing,* the first London solo exhibition by the Brazilian multidisciplinary artist. The Life Model will pose on a very slow-moving platform in the ICA's lower gallery as exhibition visitors draw them from other moving platforms. Taking the conventions of a traditional life drawing class, the Life Model will be nude and hold poses to be drawn. It is preferable for the Life Model to be able to hold poses of up to thirty minutes at a time, but this is not essential and up to the Life Model's discretion. The drawings may be kept by the exhibition visitors or hung in the exhibition space. The model will have the opportunity to meet with the artist and discuss the work and ensure full understanding of the role and artistic intention, the week before the exhibition opens (week of 19 Jan).

Safeguarding policies and procedures include but are not limited to: strictly no photography or filming of the Life Model; a trained ICA staff member being present at all

times; access to a private changing room and supply of a personal robe; comfortable seating during modelling; relevant training for the Life Model and ICA staff. Full safeguarding measures including the ICA Harassment Response Policy and Procedures will be provided upon invitation for interview.

At the heart of *The Drawing Drawing* is the reimagining of the traditional framework of the life drawing class. It will upend the traditional format of the life drawing class, blurring the lines between audience and artwork. A cornerstone of Western artistic training since the Renaissance, life drawing centres the human figure, upholds drawing as a foundational discipline and promises mastery through faithful representation of perspective and anatomy. In Lima's installation, 'drawing' is redefined as an expansive, conceptual proposition. Visitors will be invited to put pencil to paper in a life drawing class in which the core elements of the setting are recognisable, but any conventions of subject and object, of perspective and representation, mastery and value, are destabilised.

Since the mid-90s, Lima has become recognised for her artworks which explore the relationship between bodies, behaviours and their environment, questioning social expectations and accepted hierarchies by staging live situations where people, objects and spaces relate and play interact in unconventional ways.

- Model nude for an exhibition audience to draw in a gallery setting
- Hold seated poses for up to thirty min at a time on a slow-moving platform
- Participate in an exhibition artwork as a Life Model in keeping with the artistic intention of artist Laura Lima within the work *The Drawing Drawing*

- Experience in life modelling or equivalent experience
- Ability to hold a seated pose on a slow-moving platform (roughly 20 cm from the ground) for approximately 30 minutes at a time
- Confidence in being nude amongst exhibition visitors in a public gallery setting
- Experience working with artists or arts organisations preferred
- All genders, body types, ages (18+), abilities encouraged to apply
